Report of the Trustees For The Year Ended 31 March 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objectives of Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre are met through the range of services and activities offered.

These can be divided into 3 strands:

- 1) Provision of direct helping services to Muslim women via face to face information and advice sessions, telephone helpline; counselling services; advocacy and befriending.
- 2) Development activities designed to build the confidence and capacity of Muslim women, and promote wider community integration.
- 3) Strategic work with policy makers and mainstream organisations to ensure that the needs of Muslim women are taken into account in the mainstreaming agenda.

The work of Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre is regularly reviewed, with quarterly statistical monitoring of a range of variables relating to service user origin and need, and an annual review of targets and effectiveness. This process is used to identify unmet needs and monitor continued requirements for existing services.

New and expanded projects stem from this analysis of service user need, and successful funding applications to meet this need.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

This report spans 12 months until the end of March 2016. In this period overall there was a 28% growth for the organisation, attracting more diverse funding sources, such as from Dundee City Council, People's Health Trust and Rank Foundation, particularly focusing on development and support work from our Dundee base, whilst maintaining our main sources of national project funding, for at least another year.

There were also numerous staffing changes, following through with the commitment last year to create a stronger organisational management infrastructure, a new role of a North of Scotland Coordinator was introduced as well as a dedicated Finance Officer role.

This year winning funding from the People's Project, as one of the top 3 voted for projects allowed for our Violence Against Women work to use the stories of women, with permission, to create a play, 'If I Had A Girl', to reach out to more people in raising awareness of key elements of honour based violence and domestic abuse within Minority Ethnic marriages.

The changing political climate and heightening of the Syrian refugee crisis, seen the arrival of new families to Scotland via the Vulnerable Person's Relocation Scheme. Amina felt well placed with our expertise and track record of delivering direct support work to vulnerable or disadvantaged women to support new families arriving in Dundee through new funding from Dundee City Council.

Overall, more than 4000 Muslim & ME (minority ethnic) women and their families have benefited from the work the organisation does and we have recruited more than 50 volunteers from diverse backgrounds, as well as increasing membership.

The proficiency of 12 different spoken languages by staff and volunteers has helped to meet the needs of a diverse Muslim population. The time devoted by volunteers has saved money; the monetary value of their time would be over £70,000.

Our presence in the media increased with very positive coverage on BBC TV and radio and both local and national newspapers. Additionally our social media (Twitter and Facebook) presence and activity soared to over 7000 followers for our campaigns and our main organisation.

This year Amina MWRC has committed and signed up to pay the Glasgow Living Wage in line with our values of fairness and empowerment.

Helpline & Development Project

The Amina Muslim Women's Helpline has continued to provide a free phone listening ear and support service for Muslim women. Calls are answered by staff and 15 trained volunteers between the hours of 10am and 4pm on weekdays. The Helpline received 1110 calls with the top ten issues that women called about being: (1) Family (2) Marital/Relationship (3) Domestic Abuse (4) Mental Health (5) Divorce (6) Child Sexual Abuse (7) Social Isolation (8) Housing (9) Agency seeking signposting for a client (10) Immigration.

This year it was noted there had been a rise in calls about mental health. The helpline continued to operate as a Hate Crime 3rd party reporting service for Police Scotland; this year the service noted a record number of hate crime calls since its inception.

The Islamic advice service had a 10% increase in calls reaching out to more women who sought Islamic advice about often intimate issues which they felt they could not approach a male scholar about.

Development activities under the helpline project included an annual conference 'Understanding and Tackling Islamophobia' which sought to explore opportunities to tackle hate crime and Islamophobia in Scotland. The conference has also helped to underpin Amina-MWRC's future campaign focus for 2016-17.

Our annual women's conference, 'Speaking for Ourselves' took place in Perth this year attracting over 80 Muslim women and Minority Ethnic women from across Scotland, to talk about issues that affect them in their localities and wider.

The School's work in its 5th year, proving popular with teachers, pupils and volunteers, continued to run with limited funding. The staff recruited 8 volunteers to engage with school pupils in religious education classes to address

stereotypes and misconceptions related to Muslim women. From October 2015 - March 2016, 16 different schools in and around Glasgow were attended, with engagement from 1500 pupils. Some schools were visited in partnership with Interfaith Scotland and Islam Awareness Week.

Violence Against Women

The ending Violence against Women (VAW) project aims to increase awareness and understanding of issues and relevant services surrounding domestic abuse and honour based violence to Muslim and Minority Ethnic women in Scotland, with the hope of making them feel less isolated and more confident in raising VAW issues in their communities.

Storytelling and self-care workshops were held for survivors of honour based violence and domestic abuse. Coping strategies were also explored during Woodlands Workshops in conjunction with the Forestry Commission.

The Men's work continued this year with interactive domestic abuse workshops being led by Shaykh Abdul Aziz in conjunction with Amina. There was also one designed specifically for young men delivered by Shaykh Hassan Rabbani. Over 60 men have been engaged with, of which 94% making a commitment to future campaign work to prevent violence against women.

The projects new Baby Steps to Gender Equality film was launched during the 16 days of activism in November, and was praised by agencies and community members as a useful tool to raising awareness of how we as a society create attitudes and opinions on gender roles and responsibilities.

Save Energy Save Money

The Save Energy Save Money project came to an end as of 31st March 2016. The project worked with over 500 people across Glasgow. It was successful in training 82 volunteers from a wide range of communities including, Somali, Sudanese, Pakistani and Arab, on issues of climate change such as energy efficiency measures and saving in order to reduce their carbon foot print as a result of reducing energy consumption.

In addition to this 115 clients were supported to reduce their energy consumption and 35 clients were intensively supported to write off nearly £7000 in energy bills. As a legacy, the project has produced 4 videos to continue to raise awareness of both climate change and fuel poverty.

Employability

Amina's 'Inspiring Aspirations' employability project continued to grow and increase in productivity by engaging, empowering, educating and supporting more than 560 Muslim and Minority Ethnic women across Dundee, Glasgow and Perth last year, enabling women to overcome their personal barriers to progression. Attracting nearly 300 new clients, the project delivered employability training programmes, personal development workshops, English conversation classes, ESOL for Employability (in partnership with WEA) and 125 individual support sessions.

We are delighted to report that 103 women progressed to further education, paid employment, volunteering and 3 set up their own business, with 52% of those progressing, entering the paid labour market.

Building Bridges

The Building Bridges project started in December 2015 with a view to support Muslim, Minority Ethnic women to improve their skills, become more confident in participating in their communities, and facilitate support groups and activities for women experiencing social isolation through drama, creative arts, information sessions on women's rights and entitlements. The project aims to reduce social and emotional isolation for Muslim, in Dundee.

One of the most notable activities thus far has been the 'walking' football in partnership with Dundee International Women's Centre (DIWC) and Dundee Football Club. More than 30 women attended this session and reported an increase in confidence.

Educating Against Extremism

Following on from the reported increase in young people across the UK being radicalised by extremist ideologies, Scottish Government funding allowed for Amina to deliver pilot interactive workshops, 'Take Ownership' to over 100 young people (14-25 years old) across 5 different locations. The aim of the workshops was to empower young people to be active members of their community, encourage them to feel proud of their Scottish Islamic identity and provide a safe space for them to discuss issues that may affect them such as islamophobia, internet safety as well as deconstructing arguments posed by groups like ISIS.

Amina also organised and delivered its first ever youth conference, 'Infinity and Beyond' which had 110 registrations and 80 young people in attendance on the night, both male and female. The key note speaker addressed the audience, sharing his personal challenges, including of mental health as well as encouraging all to fulfil their potential.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net incoming resources, after operational expenses of £465,340, for the period were £13,801.

At the end of the financial period reserves were £40,545.

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of grant income from the Scottish Government and other charitable Trusts. The charity also relies on voluntary donations and community fundraising to meet their day to day financial commitments. These funds have been utilised to meet the operational expenses of the charity.

The Board recognises that the Centre is a "not for profit" organisation and are cognisant of the position to ensure that the organisation is managed in a manner, which acknowledges the inherent responsibilities, demands and structures, which form the reality of operating in the Scottish economy.

Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre is working towards a reserves policy that allows current work to continue post the funding date for projects where funders may not notify of decision to continue funding until after the end of the financial year. To this end the intention is to develop reserves for 3 months budgeted expenditure of all potential ongoing costs to the organisation. The reserves will be generated from unrestricted revenue as all restricted funds require to be spent within that funding year, unless particular permission has been given to extend the period of grant.

FUTURE PLANS

As the financial context in which our organisation operates becomes more challenging, our resource base may undergo significant shifts or redistribution. Continued growth can no longer be safely assumed. The onus is not only on how much resources we have to work with but also on utilising these resources in the most effective manner.

Huge reliance on public funding is still a dominating factor and will continue to remain a significant feature of the organisations overall income base but we will continue to diversify our streams of funding to maintain control of our organisational development and our overall mission. Our resources will not just take the form of monetary income as volunteering and community development will remain key features and will be promoted and developed. Volunteers are vital in sustaining some of our core services and delivering our wider mission.

We will focus more on quality assurance and the evaluation of the services delivered.

Our policies and procedures will evolve with and adapt to major social, economic and political changes.

Our service provision will at all times match the needs and cater for all the issues that are faced by Muslim women in the current climate.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The charity is regulated by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, as adopted in 2012 and amended in 2013 and 2015.

The purpose of the charity is:

To promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of Muslim women and their family members where relevant, in particular the advancement of citizenship and community development, the promotion of religious and racial harmony, the promotion of equality and diversity, the advancement of education, the relief of poverty and distress, the furtherance of health and the provision or assistance in the provision of facilities of recreation or other leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare with the object of improving the conditions of life of the aforementioned persons.

In furtherance thereof, but not otherwise, Amina will seek:-

- to enable Muslim women of all ethnic minorities to access sensitive counselling, support and advice which meets their needs, both through provision of service and supported referral mechanisms.
- to establish a helpline to reach Muslim women across Scotland including isolated women from rural communities, to access facilities and services to help meet their needs and provide confidential advice, support and counselling.
- to enable and empower Muslim women to develop self-confidence.
- to develop training and volunteering skills to increase self-confidence, enhance employment opportunities and create further resources for community development.
- to initiate outreach work in order to encourage "housebound" women to participate in local/community based activities.
- to create links, supported referral mechanisms, and network effectively with voluntary organisations, statutory agencies and local authorities in furtherance of the objectives detailed above.
- to undertake community development work within the Muslim community and to support community integration and community cohesion.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Board consists of up to 12 elected members plus up to 3 additional persons appointed by the Board. Board members are elected at the AGM and entitled to serve for 3 years. Retiring Board members are entitled to stand for election.

A person shall not be eligible for election as a director unless she is a member of the company. An appointed Director need not be a member of the company but must agree to adhere to the Memorandum and Articles and promote the interests of the company.

The quorum for Board meetings shall be four members, at least two of whom shall be elected.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

Amina - The Muslim Women's Resource Centre has changed its legal form from an unincorporated charity to an incorporated charity effective from 1 October 2012. OSCR consent was received regarding the change of legal form. The company limited by guarantee was incorporated on the 19 September 2012, and undertook the charity's aims from 1 October 2012. All the assets and liabilities of the unincorporated charity as at 30 September 2012 were transferred to the incorporated charity on 1 October 2012.

Governance and Management

The overall control of the Centre lies with the Board who have the power to decide on all matters concerning Amina the Muslim Women's Resource Centre, subject to the memorandum and articles, and policy made at the AGM. The Chief Executive Officer has overall responsibility for the operational management of the organisation and she line manages project managers who manage their own projects, project staff and volunteers.

The Chairperson is responsible for the management of the Board and the Chief Executive Officer is responsible for the day to day management of the Centre. Both the Chairperson and the Chief Executive Officer report directly to the Board, with the Chief Executive Officer being line managed by the Chairperson. The Chief Executive Officer line manages the project coordinators employed by the Centre, who in turn manage project officers, sessional staff and volunteers.

Volunteers form a major asset of Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre. Once trained for the role, they are involved in all aspects of service user support, assist with administration, and have become involved in development work. Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre has a fully developed volunteer policy which identifies recruitment, and support and supervision arrangements for volunteers.

Risk management

The Board have examined the major strategic and operational risks, which the Centre faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

As with all voluntary sector organisations, Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre is vulnerable to changes in public policy affecting statutory funding. The Trustees are highly aware that funding for three main statutory funded projects currently runs until end March 2017, and that there is severe financial pressure on statutory sources.

Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre has developed a fundraising strategy designed to diversify the sources of funding, and increase sustainable fundraising streams, for the period beyond 2016. In addition to applications to a range of statutory and charitable trust funds, the plans for community based fundraising and individual donations will bring in increased levels of funding from this stream during the forthcoming financial years. In furtherance of this Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre continues to invest in fundraising training for staff and volunteers.

Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre is aware of the potential risks attached to the provision of advice, counselling and befriending. To counter this, the Centre invests in training for staff and volunteers, has robust supervision and risk management procedures, and in case of a claim, professional indemnity insurance to cover such eventualities.

Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre will carry out effective risk assessment and management in order to identify, evaluate and attempt to control all potential risks. Although it is not possible for us to eliminate risk factors entirely, we will endeavour to reduce these risks to a level that the organisation is comfortable with, be it governance, external, regulatory and compliance, operational or financial factors. We will continue our analysis of all risk factors and will aim to prioritise them, reduce and control them, monitor them and have assurance that the controls put in place are working as planned.

To protect against financial fraud, Amina - the Muslim Women's Resource Centre has financial policies that require two authorised signatures on all accounts, identifies levels of financial liability that can be entered into by staff members, and ensures checks on cash handling.

The trustees (who are also the directors of Amina - The Muslim Women's Resource Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. Report of the Independent Auditors to the Trustees and Members of Amina - The Muslim Women's Resource Centre

We have audited the financial statements of Amina - The Muslim Women's Resource Centre for the year ended 31 March 2016 on pages twelve to twenty three. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with Chapter 3 of Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006, and to the charitable company's trustees, as a body, in accordance with Section 44(1)(c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and regulation 10 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's members and trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company and the charitable company's members and trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees Responsibilities set out on page nine, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

We have been appointed as auditors under Section 44(1)(c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and under the Companies Act 2006 and report in accordance with regulations made under those Acts.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the financial statements. In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Report of the Trustees to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements and to identify any information that is apparently materially incorrect based on, or materially inconsistent with, the knowledge acquired by us in the course of performing the audit. 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Taxation

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
